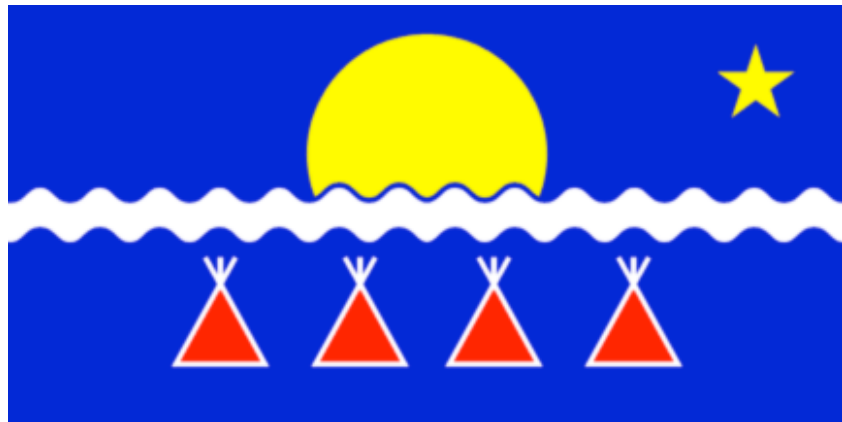




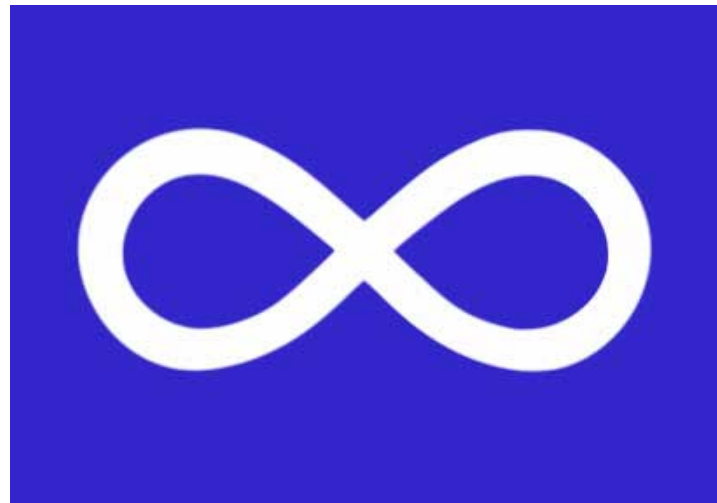
Elsipogtog First Nation is the largest Miqmaq community in New Brunswick Canada.



The traditional land of the Tilcho includes a vast area of boreal forests, waterways, and tundra from the northern shores of Great Slave Lake to almost the shores of Northwest Territories of Canada



The community of Eabametoong First Nation is situated on the north shore of Eabamet Lake, located 360 kilometers north of Thunder Bay. The Eabametoong have kept their way of life through fishing, hunting and gathering food.



The Métis Flag was first used by Métis resistance fighters in Canada prior to the Battle of Seven Oaks in 1816. The flag is either blue or red with a white infinity symbol superimposed on top. The symbol represents the mixing of the European immigrants and the First Nations peoples, which creates a new and distinct culture, the Métis.



The Treaty 4 flag was envisioned by the late Elder Gordon Oakes whose dream it was for the people of Treaty 4 territory to have their own flag to be raised with the national and provincial flags. Elder Oakes' son Larry Oakes explained, "The flag represents the spirit of working together with all people on this land."
